

<u>Mary Kay Andrews</u> is the New York Times bestselling author of 30 novels (including <u>The Homewreckers</u>; <u>The Santa Suit</u>; <u>The Newcomer</u>; <u>Hello, Summer</u>; <u>Sunset Beach</u>; <u>The High Tide Club</u>; <u>The Weekenders</u>; <u>Beach Town</u>; <u>Save the Date</u>; <u>Ladies' Night</u>; <u>Christmas Bliss</u>; <u>Spring Fever</u>; <u>Summer Rental</u>; <u>The Fixer Upper</u>; <u>Deep Dish</u>; <u>Blue Christmas</u>; <u>Savannah Breeze</u>; <u>Hissy Fit</u>; <u>Little Bitty Lies</u>; and <u>Savannah Blues</u>), and one cookbook. The Beach House Cookbook.

A native of St. Petersburg, Florida, she earned a B.A. in journalism from The University of Georgia. After a 14-year career working as a reporter at newspapers including <u>The Savannah Morning News</u>, <u>The Marietta Journal</u>, and <u>The Atlanta Journal-Constitution</u>, where she spent the final ten years of her career, she left journalism in 1991 to write fiction.



Andy Davidson is the Bram Stoker Award-nominated author of <u>The Hollow Kind</u>, <u>The Boatman's Daughter</u>, and <u>In the Valley of the Sun</u>. His work has been listed among NPR's Best Books of the year, the New York Public Library's Best Adult Books of the Year, and <u>Library Journal's</u> Best Horror. <u>Marlena Frank</u> has always been fascinated by monsters, and now gets to write about them. She is the author of young adult fantasy and horror novels, short stories, novellas, and series. Many of her books have hit the Amazon bestseller charts, including her debut novel, <u>Stolen</u>, and her latest book release, <u>The Impostor and Other Dark Tales</u>. 

Her family roots are in the Southeast, though she was raised as an army "brat" and has lived in many places. For years she taught high school in the US and abroad. She lives in Georgia, on perpetual deadline, with her coffee habit, two cats, and an impressive LEGO build collection.

Born and raised in Georgia, <u>James Tuck</u> grew up drawing and reading from a wee lad. A steady helping of Robert E. Andrew was writing and selling short stories to the employees at his grandfather's business (and to his classmates at school) since he was six years old, realizing early on that writing was his favorite form of expression.

One of the cuentos shared with him by his Abuelo Rene and Abuela Ines, the story of the day his family left Cuba, is what first became the short-story, The Cuban Dream, and eventually inspired his debut novel, The Guava Tree.

Andrew continues to write fiction (with a second novel in-progress) and is passionate about uplifting the Latino community in the United States, having served at the board or committee level of multiple non-profits, and currently serves as the Vice Chairman of HoPe (Hispanic Organization Promoting Education), the largest Latino/Hispanic educational leadership program in the US. He lives in Atlanta with his wife, and their two young children.





Broadleaf Writers Association Code of Conduct

<u>Overview</u>

Broadleaf Writers Association envisions a community enriched by the literary arts. This community aims to be welcoming, inclusive, respectful, and safe for all. To that end, Broadleaf Writers has adopted the following Code of Conduct and terms and conditions.

All Broadleaf Writers Association ("BWA") program participants are subject to and must abide by the BWA Code of Conduct. By registering for or attending a Broadleaf Writers Association ("BWA") program, participants acknowledge and agree they have read and understood the Code of Conduct. Any person, guest, student, media representative, speaker, or exhibitor who is present at a BWA program is considered a participant.

BWA encourages participant discussion and engagement during its programs, and on its social media channels and online platforms because we believe diversity of opinion and thought is critical to creative engagement. When engaging with one another, participants are expected to act in a civil and collegial manner at all times. BWA will not tolerate harassment or intimidation of its participants or anyone connected to any program sponsored by BWA, regardless of format or forum. Examples of impermissible behavior include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Offensive or abusive physical contact;
- Repeated or persistent unwanted physical contact;
- Use of slurs or offensive nicknames or terms of endearment;
- Unwelcome comments about a person's clothing, body, or personal life; or
- Offensive jokes or unwelcome innuendo.

Participants who engage in inappropriate conduct may be removed from BWA programs, whether online or in-person, or from BWA social media channels or interactive platforms without further warning. The decision to remove a participant from some or all of BWA's programs, channels, or platforms shall be made in BWA's sole discretion. Participants removed from a paid program because they are in violation of the code of conduct will not be eligible for a refund of program or membership costs. Do not use BWA's website or BWA's social media accounts for any unauthorized purpose.





Reporting an Issue

Participants finding themselves in a situation where they feel their safety or comfort are at risk or who become aware of a participant not in compliance with this code of conduct should contact a BWA staff person or director so that the matter can be resolved. Staff and directors are identifiable by a name badge and ribbon or by a nametag. For virtual events, the program host may be contacted via private message, or the participant may choose to email the BWA Executive Director, Zachary Steele, at zach@broadleafwriters.com. At the annual conference, reports of misconduct may be made at the registration desk, with the conference chairperson, or via email to the Executive Director. Reports can be made at any time. BWA requests that a report be filed as soon as possible, so that concerns can be resolved immediately. Reports will be taken seriously and handled appropriately regardless of when they are made.

Retaliation in response to asking a question, raising a concern in good faith, or participating in an investigation will not be tolerated. Knowingly making a false report or reporting with malice or disregard for the truth is also prohibited and may result in removal from BWA programs, channels, or platforms.

Terms and Conditions

Participants in violation of rules and/or who behave in an unsafe or careless manner may be asked to leave and will be held responsible for their actions. Participants acknowledge that such violations may result in the attendee being removed from the event or forum and barred from returning without refund of the participant's registration fee. Participants likewise acknowledge and agree that all participants have the right to enjoy BWA programs equally. Disruptive behavior that interferes with the conduct of reasonable business, or any other attendee's safety or comfort, may result in the participant being removed from the event/forum (in-person or virtual) and barred from returning/rejoining without refund of the participant's registration fee.

Indemnity

To the extent permitted by law, the participant agrees to protect, indemnify, defend, and hold harmless BWA, its directors, Board members, and volunteers against all claims, losses, damages, costs, third party claims, settlements, liabilities and/or the like, including, but not limited to attorneys' fees or other professionals' fees, costs, or expenses, arising from or relating to the actions or failure to act of the BWA, its directors, Board members, or volunteers.





Access Guidelines

BWA is committed to making all reasonable arrangements that will allow participants to participate in all in-person events. In order to help BWA better prepare, please submit requests for special services, equipment, or accommodations in advance of the event so they can be timely evaluated. Lost Registration Badge

In the event programming cannot be held or is postponed due to events beyond BWA's control, BWA shall not be liable to participant for any damages, costs, or losses incurred, such as transportation costs, accommodations costs, or financial losses.





Paid participants may request a refund for any event (refund terms defined within event descriptions).
